Dear Residents,



This summer has been very productive in developing and implementing our capital projects:

- The irrigation system replacement on the Lakes Course is continuing well;
- The new Maintenance Building is going up at the Grounds Maintenance location and once it is finished, we will enclose the entire maintenance site with an attractive new fence which will improve the entire area's presentation;
- The waste water recycling system at Grounds Maintenance is being installed;
- The fuel management system to better control and track fuel usage is complete and working;
- The Microsurfacing and Crack Sealing work roadway work is underway and will be the last roadway work preformed until next summer;
- The Horseshoe Pits renovation is being bid; and the development of the conceptual plan for the Residents Recreational Complex is in progress; and
- Country Club improvements to restrooms, kitchen and dining area were preformed during the two-week closing.

Once the new maintenance building is finished, we will be razing the old maintenance building behind the Lodge in order to open up views to the lake from both the Lodge as well as the homes along the Lakes Course number 9 fairway.

STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE
September 2010



The last update, in our May newsletter, mentioned the ten Key Strategic Issues that were developed and linked to Action Plans. The cadres of the Strategic Planning Team (SPT) have been addressing these Action Plans and are offering the following status report.

1: Establish quality standards for the community's physical assets.

Work still needs to be done. Bob Walker is developing a work sheet showing priorities of Safety & Regulatory Compliance, Functionality, and Appearance, indexing those priorities to the 16 asset categories of the McGladrey Report.

2: Construct a definition of "affordability".

The SPT has completed its work on this action plan. The short definition is the last item of our Core Values.

3: Establish a budgeting and spending philosophy.

The SPT has completed its work on this action plan. The document will be submitted for Board of Directors (BOD) approval in September or October; when our snowbird residents return to Paradise.

4: Enhance the promotion and visibility of Timber Pines.

This action plan is "in process" under leadership of the Community Relations Committee. Components are signage and the new DVD; augmented by the willing work of the Ambassadors Club.

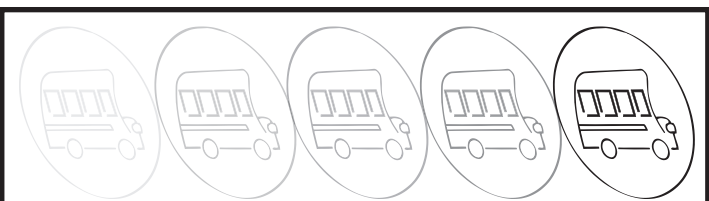

5: Establish a community governance policy.

This is a work in progress. The draft of a two page document entitled INTRODUCTION & GOVERNANCE POLICY was distributed and discussed at length by the SPT. Several relatively minor changes were suggested. One possible use would be to replace the first section of the "Rules & Regulations" with this document, in order to provide a more comprehensive summary of our governance structure.

The SPT also plans to present this item for BOD approval in the fall.

6: Create a water management plan.

A multi-year plan was completed in June 2010. The work is in process and should continue.

7: Create a technology strategic plan.

A two page document entitled "Policy for the Strategic Use of Technology" was distributed by John Sharp for SPT review. Mr. Sharp suggested a 12/1/10 target date for presentation to the BOD.

8: Establish a policy for addressing poorly maintained and/or abandoned homes.

Mr. Sharp E-mailed the SPT a draft of such a policy. It needs legal validation, but essentially says we can do whatever it reasonably takes to maintain a property and can charge the owners. SPT members will comment and prepare a draft for review by the BOD and, given BOD approval, our attorney's review.

9: Establish a permanent Strategic Planning Team

The SPT was chartered by the BOD in September 2009.

10: Create a core values and vision visibility plan.

The Vision & Core Value plaques shown at various locations in Timber Pines were prepared by the SPT and approved by the BOD. They are usually reproduced on the first page of our monthly Newsletter.

11: 5-10 year strategic planning.

The SPT believes that this subject should be formally studied. Bill Wagner discussed several methodologies – present state vs. future state, resident survey, other HOA approaches – and will develop a white paper for SPT discussion.

Bob Walker mentioned "Strategies" categories that might be found useful. Beautification, Operating Efficiency, Communications, Financial and Modernization were discussed briefly.

We were reminded that, with normal BOD turnover, historical GM turnover, and with committee changes, short term emphasis changes are inevitable, but a long range strategic plan would help mitigate those changes and aid in a consistent and less controversial major project implementation process. Many organizations have found that a 5-10 year plan with a yearly update would be appropriate for their needs.

FERTIGATION – WHAT IS IT?

You may have heard the word "fertigation" in conjunction with the irrigation project now underway at Timber Pines. Simply stated, it is the integration of fertilization with irrigation. For Timber Pines it means the introduction of a liquid fertilizer or a liquid chemical treatment agent into the irrigation flow in a continuous, controlled manner. The liquid is injected at a pre-determined rate proportional to the volume of water being pumped. Typically the application rate varies from one gallon of liquid fertilizer to 1,000 to 5,000 gallons of water depending on turf needs.

The fertigation system consists of a liquid fertilizer storage tank, a liquid chemical storage tank, flow monitoring sensor, two variable speed metering pumps and a proportional flow control panel.

Fertigation has a number of advantages. They are as follows.

1. More efficient utilization of the fertilizer
SOME Dry fertilizers rest on the ground surface and depend on rain or irrigation spray to begin the migration process to the grass roots. **OTHER DRY FERTILIZERS THAT MAY BE UTILIZED RELEASE THEIR NUTRIENT ANALYSIS BASED ON THE EXISTING AMBIENT TEMPERATURES WHICH IS WHY DRY FERTILIZERS WILL CONTINUE TO BE APPLIED.** Liquid fertilizers are completely soluble in water. Therefore, they go wherever the irrigation water goes. That is highly efficient. Golf course superintendents who have utilized fertigation have estimated a reduction in fertilizer volumes of 15 % and greater. However, because fertigation is a slow, uniform process, there will be occasions when dry fertilizers are required for fast response to a local condition.
2. Turf burn is avoided
Application of dry fertilizers has the potential of creating burn streaks or patches if they are distributed unevenly. Liquid fertilizers are introduced at a uniform rate in small quantities in the irrigation flow. Therefore, turf burn can't happen. **(DELETE PREVIOUS SENTENCE) This could happen at times due to the fertilizer analysis being applied, equipment malfunctions such as irrigation rotors not turning or zones remaining on beyond established run time. Doesn't happen very often but does need to be considered.**
3. Uniform growth of turf
Because the liquid fertilizer is introduced in a well-designed spray pattern on almost a daily basis, growth peaks and valleys are avoided. Golf course superintendents who operate fertigation systems have reported improved turf quality.
4. Non-interruption of play
Since fertilization would occur with irrigation system operation (usually at night), play will not be interrupted.
5. Labor saving
The liquid fertilizer and the chemical treatment agent are delivered and placed directly into the storage tanks by the supplier. Since the application of the liquids is automatic, there is no labor required for fertigation other than the periodic tweaking of the application rate depending on turf needs. That operation takes only a few minutes.

Fertigation has been used on an international scale for over thirty years. It has been used for greenhouse vegetables, greenhouse ornamentals, farm crops, and golf courses. One fertigation system supplier has over 1,800 systems installed and operating on golf courses around the world.

Access Control & Community Patrol

Congratulations to the forty-four (44) Timber Pines staff members who were recently trained and certified in CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and in the use of an AED (automated external defibrillator) in accordance with the American Heart Association.

Our Community Access Defibrillation Program includes defibrillator stations in the Lodge, Fitness Center, Country Club Restaurant, Performing Arts Center, Golf & Grounds Maintenance Building and Community Patrol.

Residents are encouraged to attend a CPR or an AED/CPR training class through the American Heart Association, local hospitals, YMCA's or by attending a free Community CPR Program conducted by Spring Hill Fire Rescue. If you are interested call the SHFR Administrative Offices at 754-5800.

It is popular and convenient for many members and their guests to travel in golf carts throughout the community, but what happens if they are involved in an accident? Will your home owner's insurance policy cover property damage and medical expenses? I have heard some insurance companies **only cover golf carts to, from and on the golf course or on your own private property** and usually it's just limited liability.

So, if you or one of your guests is driving a golf cart to the Country Club or Lodge pool and the driver crashes into another parked golf cart, an automobile, a building, a bicyclist or you hit a pedestrian? Property damage may just be a few hundred or a thousand or so, but the medical bills could total thousands of dollars and you will be responsible for them. By the way, all of the above accidents actually happened in Timber Pines. Most were not covered and the owners were responsible! Unfortunately, one person did not even have home owner's insurance. Please check with your insurance agent to see what you are covered for and what you should have.

Many members have obtained separate golf cart insurance policies which include liability, UM/UIIM (Uninsured/Underinsured motorist coverage), medical payments and physical damage. If you have one of those fancy custom carts, you may even want accessory coverage. These separate policies are quite inexpensive and after hearing what uninsured members have experienced, it's well worth it.

Don't forget to have your golf cart regularly inspected (tires, batteries, brakes, steering, etc.) and keep it properly maintained and in safe operating condition.

During the month of July, Community Patrol Officers were out deterring and educating vendors, service providers, contractors, visitors and members who were not obeying the traffic & safety rules. Their efforts resulted in numerous verbal warnings and a total of thirty-six (36) traffic violations and one (1) solicitation. Seventeen (17) vendors, service personnel and contractors received violations along with ten (10) members and nine (9) guests. Administrative warning letters were also sent to the following operators who received onsite violations. These include 3-Home Health Care workers, American Prime Steak Company (Soliciting), Paul Shroder Heating & Cooling, Artistic Lawn Care, Pizza Hut, Harold's Wreckers, Florida Building Inspections, C3 Couriers, JNS Property management, Spring Hill Lock & Key,

Realty Executives America, Mattress Giant, Terminix, Braccio Tile and Brighthouse. Patrol also issued numerous verbal warnings for improperly parked vehicles, no traffic cones, etc.

Due to the extremely hot weather, snakes are becoming more active. A few members have called us because they see snakes in their yards and they are afraid they might be poisonous. **Wildlife Officers recommend backing off and leaving the snakes alone as they part of the environment. Most problems occur when people try to get a closer look or try to kill them.** Florida has 50 species of snakes and only 6 that are venomous, including the eastern coral snake, the southern copperhead, the cottonmouth, the eastern diamondback rattlesnake, the canebrake, and the dusky pygmy rattlesnake. I would say that 98% of the snakes that have been reported to Patrol in the past 12 years have been non-venomous!

If you think a snake is venomous, you can call a nuisance wildlife trapper (most charge a fee) or call Patrol and we will show you color photographs of the venomous snakes. Patrol does not handle venomous snakes, but if a snake is identified as venomous and we can view it from a safe distance, for community safety purposes, we will secure the area and call the local "snake man" to remove it. Please be careful when you are out working in your yard or on the golf courses and remember the #1 rule if you come across a snake: **If you leave THEM alone, THEY will leave you alone!**

When you observe **suspicious activity, report it immediately to the Sheriff's Office** by dialing **9-1-1**. Don't procrastinate, do not wait till the next morning, please do it right away! The results will benefit you and your community. Secondly, you should notify the **Community Patrol Office** by calling **666-2144**.

Treasurer's Notes

During the week of August 9 our financial files and records were audited by representatives from the Certified Public Accounting firm, McGladrey & Pullen so that they can prepare the financial report discussed below. This audit is completed annually in compliance with Florida Statute 720.303 which requires that "An association with total annual revenues of \$ 400,000 or more [TPCA revenues in FY 2010 totaled \$ 9,838,215] shall prepare audited financial statements." Furthermore, the Statute directs that "Within 90 days after the end of the fiscal year [June 30 in our case] ...the association shall prepare and complete, or contract with a third party [McGladrey & Pullen in our case] for the preparation and completion of, a financial report for the preceding fiscal year." The Statute further requires that "...not later than 120 days after the end of the fiscal year [by October 28] ...the association shall...provide a written notice that a copy of the financial report is available upon request at no charge to the member."

As members, we can feel assured that our revenues, expenditures and assets are being properly accounted for when our auditors report as they did last year that "In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Timber Pines Community Association, Inc. as of June 30, 2009, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America." We can anticipate no less a favorable report for this year since our accounting procedures have remained consistent with those previously followed.

We are additionally assured of proper fiscal accountability by the conscientious work of our own Internal Audit Committee consisting of Chairman Bill Sullivan, Vice Chair Tom Jones, Secretary Regina Webb, and members Peter Baird, Linda Day, Judi Meetze, Paul Richards and Shirley Ricker. They work regularly and tirelessly each month to: review bank reconciliations; investments; count cash drawers; review payables including contracts; perform periodic checks of stickers for golf carts; verify payroll deductions for insurance; inventory leased and owned equipment; observation of physical inventories at the Country Club (food and beverage) and Pro Shop (items for sale); review gas and diesel usage; check storage lot permits; distribute paychecks; match registered golfers per Pro Shop records to Accounting records; and, review TPCA sponsored activities for appropriate matching of expense and revenues. Our many and varied accountability centers could be real sources of concern for all of us if not for these great volunteers who willingly give back to Timber Pines. Thanks to all who give so generously to keep Timber Pines the Best place to live!

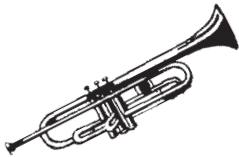

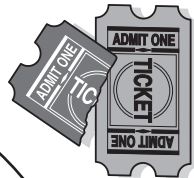

The team has updated all portable radios & are preparing for Hurricane season. These were given by the Board to CERT since new radios were purchased for staff. We are planning a member to member radio test of the equipment.

We provide our weekly radio tests as part of the County Radio Team. We have four ICOM two way radios to communicate with the County.

Our Team man hours are logged monthly and submitted to the County Emergency Management in a Quarterly Report. (394 hours for the 1st & 2nd Qtrs.)

CERT is coordination with Nina Mattei of the Hernando County Health Dept. on the Strategic NTL Stock/Point of Distribution Program. Our Board did sign the MOA in July to become a partner in the HCHD Cities Readiness Initiative. CERT has (17) trained members on the SNS/POD and issued the Timber Pines plan of action. POD is planned for the PAC. We have the Health Dept. Volunteer paperwork and are looking for additional volunteers besides our CERT members to join and help when the medication deployment takes place.

Remember a Hard Line Phone is required when a disaster occurs. They cost less than 15.00 and plug into your wall jack! Check the Library for all the up to date Hurricane information – it's FREE!

The Sheriff Deputy will initiate the investigation. Beware of your surroundings at all times whether day or night. If it looks suspicious make that important call to 911.

[Because of a publishing glitch, the article that appeared in this space last month was a reprint of the July column. The article that should have appeared will be published in a future Newsletter.]

Most of you will recall that the "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" program was begun about a year and a half ago by the Village Reps. Frank Sayers who was Chairman of the Village Reps at the time asked me to spearhead the program.

The idea was to attempt to build on the informal assistance programs that are in place in most villages. At the time, we were beginning to see instances where local villages were becoming less able to provide temporary assistance to a needy resident, typically because more and more of the village residents were themselves in need of help. The program attempted to identify persons throughout the Timber Pines community who would be willing to help persons in villages other than their own should the need arise.

This program was instituted under the auspices of the Village Reps, and its existence was well known to the Board of Directors. It thus took on the "look and feel" of a formal program of the Timber Pines community, complete with the potential for corporate liability that attends formal activities of the Association.

To understand the extent of potential corporate exposure, we sought advice of legal counsel, which confirmed that while this program was never officially sanctioned by the Board of Directors, the corporation could be held liable in the event of a program-related mishap.

As a result of this opinion, the Village Reps have voted to terminate the program and immediately cease all program-related activities.

I, along with the entire Village Reps organization, sincerely hope that the individual villages will continue to do what they have always done to provide temporary assistance to villagers in need. We never know when we might be the ones needing help.

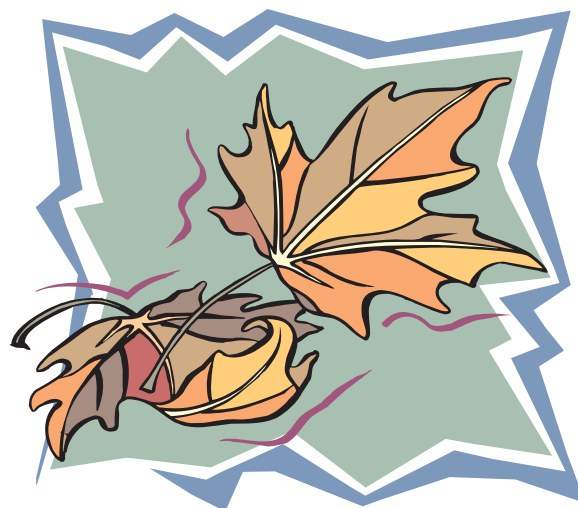
